<u>UC Davis Camelid Symposium:</u> The Symposium held in January was sponsored by Calpaca. The knowledge of the speakers from all over the world was amazing. Even the most experienced breeder or seasoned camelid veterinarian had an opportunity to learn new information in the raising of camelids. In addition to alpaca breeders present there were many llama breeders as well as at least one camel breeder.





The Gold Country Gathering 2016

I bought my first alpacas in May of 2010 and my first show was the Gold Country Gathering in Grass Valley ~ wow what a beautiful place!! The rain started Saturday and didn't stop for the rest of the weekend. When we got to the fairgrounds Sunday our animals were knee deep in water! What a mess! Who thought it could get any worse than that??

I moved to Grass Valley in October of 2015, no Gold Country Gathering that year. I agreed to be the Event Manager and bring back the show in 2016....after all it was my favorite alpaca show! It was more work than I expected but I pushed through thanks to the help from the past Event Managers and others who had more experience putting on shows. Feeling confident that my experienced Event Managers and volunteers had helped get everything lined up for the best Gold Country Gathering yet I finally started to feel all the work had paid off..... but then came the weather forecast predicting a weekend of rain that led to a very busy week before the event. Our First National Alpaca Farm Days!

In past years Bear River Alpacas has not hosted National Alpaca Farm Days events due to our location. The ranch is nestled between Auburn and Lincoln, California, off of Garden Bar Rd. which is a beautiful drive but a bit of a winding road. We have always felt we would have a low turnout because the drive was just too inconvenient. So, this year we decided to hold an event at our local feed store "Sierra Hay & Feed" which is conveniently located on the old Highway 65 in Lincoln. This idea came about when we were asked to bring some alpacas to an "Open House" that Sierra Hay and Feed held when they moved to their new location. The alpacas were the hit of the party and people talked about it for months. When I approached the owner, Diana, with the idea of holding our event there, she was more than happy to help. Diana was instrumental in making the event a success and a success it was!

The event included music, food, shopping, games and activities for the kids and a raffle. We set up an "Information Booth" and a "Demonstration" area. A Forestville 4-H Group came to represent 4-H and our local FFA group held a fundraiser selling hotdogs, sodas and water. The local Bar-Ale representative also had a booth to answer questions and hand out samples. And of course there were the alpacas!

The first area was the "Alpaca Information" area that explained what an alpaca is and all the things we can do with them. One of the most common questions is "What can you do with an alpaca?" There was information that explained the difference between a Llama and an alpaca (second most common question I get asked) along with alpaca "terminology" and information regarding the health care and feeding of alpacas. We also provided a table with brochures published by Calpaca and AOA to provide additional information.

The next area was a "Demonstration Area" where we provided demonstrations on spinning, loom weaving, knitting, peg looms, and crocheting. We also set up a table with samples of raw fiber, batts, rovings, rug yarn, lighter weight alpaca yarns, nuno felting and needle felting with explanations on what they were and what they were used for.

One of the most successful aspects of the event was a sign up sheet for joining an Alpaca 4-H group. For the past year we had been actively seeking a 4-H Alpaca Project Leader without much success. I truly believe that this is an area that the alpaca industry has not promoted enough. It is the perfect fit for the male alpacas that everyone seems to be trying to find homes for. We had 3 children sign up, found a project leader AND SOLD 2 CRIAS for the group! The 4-H Group that helped at the event even did a Trail Course demonstration which everyone enjoyed.

If you are one of those breeders that always seems to need a home for your young male crias I would encourage you to contact your local county agriculture department for information on organizing a 4-H or FFA group. You don't have to be the project leader or the group leader. Just do what I did, volunteer some time to attend the meetings to share your experience and provide the education.


Warping a loom demonstration

Editor's note: the educational component for the November Calpaca meeting is a round table discussion focusing on creating an exit plan in your business. One of the topics includes who has the power to sell/rehome the animals, where is the paper work? Jo at AOA supplied us with the following information about AOA guidelines.

Exit Strategy—AOA Guidelines For Handling The Paperwork

At some point in time, alpaca owners will find themselves talking about how they plan to leave the alpaca business. Whether it is through planned downsizing and herd reduction, passing the herd on to family members, or another strategy it is never too early to prepare or organize the paperwork.

How prepared are you when it comes to the paperwork required by AOA to complete the transfer of your registered alpacas? If, for whatever reason(s), you were no longer available to answer questions about the paperwork for your herd would your family, spouse, business partner know how or where to access the vital records needed to continue or close out your alpaca business? Ask yourself if anyone other than you knows where to locate the following basic records associated with your alpaca business:

- the original AOA certificates
- breeding records

If the answer is no, then that is the place to start with planning your exit strategy.

Planned Strategy: When exiting the alpaca business whether it be planned or not there are certain things that can make the process much easier.

When retiring or down sizing provide the new owners or buyers with:

- signed certificates for all registered alpacas to be transferred
- application for registration forms with all information for alpacas that are not registered with signatures
- all breeding records for alpacas they are taking possession of in case of sire not qualifying
- your availability for questions or authorizations if needed

Unplanned: When exiting the alpaca business is not planned provide the new owners or buyers with:

- a copy of the death certificate...this must be provided to AOA
- a copy of will or paperwork with executor of the estate information
 - the executor can sign certificates once AOA has the paperwork for account
- if certificates are missing, need to fill out Verification of Lost Document form
- application for registration forms with all information for alpacas that are not registered with executor signature
- all breeding records for alpacas they are taking possession of in case of sire not qualifying

AOA understands that sometimes it may be easier to deal directly with the executor for authorizations and forms and that perhaps they may not know a lot about alpacas but will help them and explain the process to complete.

"Multiple Streams of Income"

You can generate income from several different revenue streams with your alpaca farm:

- **1. Selling alpacas**: Many ranches hold on to most of their females and sell their males. How you choose which ones to keep and which ones to sell depends on quality, your income needs and the goals of your farm.
- **2. Fiber sales**: Granted, it's not much right now because there just aren't enough mills to do the processing, but many ranchers find that fiber sales pay for their herd's feed for the year, and expects that the fiber market will materialize in earnest in 5 to 10 years.
- **3. Retail Products**: You can import or sell homemade items from the alpaca fleece. Profits can be made in a variety of finished goods and yarn at your own ranch store.
- **4. Boarding fees**: If you begin offering your ranch as a place to board alpacas for people who haven't yet bought land or only want alpacas as an investment, you can make an income from boarding fees. Most full-time alpaca ranchers have boarding alpacas on their farms and charge between \$2.50 and \$4.00 per day per alpaca, monthly. This can provide some regular cash flow to a full-time rancher.
- **5. Stud fees**: Depending on the quality of your herdsire, you can make several hundred to several thousand dollars per service.
- **6. Brokering**: Some very knowledgeable alpaca ranchers arrange the buying and selling of the perfect alpacas for existing herds. They command up to a 15 percent brokerage fee.
- **7. Showmanship or halter training**: Since alpacas are highly intelligent, they can be easily trained. (Children and teens often enter animals into agility training competitions at alpaca shows.) Some alpaca show experts train new owners on how to work with their alpacas to get them ready for the show ring and are paid to do so.
- **8. Your special skill**: Think about what you enjoy doing naturally. How can it be transferred into a service for the alpaca industry? Do you like to drive? Do you work with wood or metal? What about graphic design or web development? Are you an artist? Do you love working with the fiber? Do you have administrative skills? Do you enjoy writing, selling and advertising? All these skills are needed in the alpaca industry. Can you think of more?
