WHY SHOW MATURE ALPACAS



Recently it occurred to Scott and I that we would really like to get comments on how our stud males were holding up with their fiber qualities as they were maturing. What better way than taking them to an alpaca show that happened to have two senior judges nationally known. The California Classic Round Up in April provided us with just that. Certainly a risk, but worth the reward. We decided to enter four of our mature males, ages ranging from 5 years old to over 7. All males were breeding and some have cria on the ground and in the show ring.

The risk of course is having the judge tell you your animal should not be used for breeding and luckily that did not happen, but the reward was having a judge tell you your alpaca was still showing uniformity of micron across both sides of his blanket and displaying an expression of beautiful crimpy fleece that is still very processable. And very exciting to us to have a nationally known judge award one of our suri males with a Reserve Color Championship stating that his fleece showed great regrowth, style, silky hand and great luster for his advancing age.



The comments certainly made us feel we were right to continue to use these males in our breeding program and allowed the public to see how males were holding up in their advancing ages. I would highly recommend bringing your older gentlemen out just for the comments alone from the judges. And the judges also appreciated the opportunity to be able to get their hands on older males and see how they were maturing.



Special Presentation on Embryo Transfers in Alpacas

Before the Saturday night dinner at the California Classic Senior AOA Jude Anderson gave a very informative talk about ET in alpacas. She talked about her personal experience with the procedures when used on females from her alpacas in Australia. She discussed the pros and cons and risks and rewards of the process. Those in attendance were invited to ask questions and in her usual manner Judge Jude answered them with directness and thoroughness.

In Case You Missed the February Calpaca Meeting Presentation by Dr. John Madigan

Dr. John Madigan. Dr. Madigan is the principle researcher in the "Clinical Trial of the Madigan Squeeze method for treatment of equine neonatal maladjustment syndrome", the medical name for "dummy foal" syndrome.

"We want all our fellow Calpaca members to know that Dave & I used Dr. Madigan's "Squeeze" research method on a cria born this spring with severe symptoms of a dummy cria. All of those manifestations amazingly were reversed with the "squeeze maneuver". There are few things in life that are this simple, easy, that have such profound positive results. This is something every alpaca owner should learn to do. Some of the most exciting news about Dr. Madigan's research is that he and the UC Davis Mind Institute are collaborating on research between his findings in animals and autism in humans."

Llama Enthusiast

Supports Unique Clinical Opportunities

When Joy Pedroni of Black Cat Llamas needs veterinary assistance with her small herd of 15, she knows exactly who to call – Dr. Julie Dechant, a specialist in the veterinary hospital's Large Animal Clinic. Pedroni is a longtime client and has been a great resource for students.

"I can't say enough about the hospital," Pedroni said. "The compassion everyone shows is paramount for me. They always make me and my animals feel like we're the most important ones there."

On several occasions, Pedroni has been the driving force behind llama and alpaca rescues, and brought dozens of camelids to the hospital. The rescued animals generally come from defunct sanctuaries, owner abandonments and hoarding situations. Brought to the hospital for wellness examinations, sterilizations, hoof trimmings and sheerings, the camelids Pedroni rescues provide great learning opportunities for students who are eager to work on animals they normally would not see on their hospital rounds. Pedroni sometimes utilizes her llamas as pack animals on camping and hiking trips,

and says that this is an increasingly popular activity among camelid enthusiasts. Llamas participate in events and shows, similar to horses and dogs, and Pedroni uses hers as goodwill ambassadors in parades and agriculture events for children. Llamas are even brought to hospitals and retirement communities as therapy animals. As these activities increase and ownership becomes more commonplace, the hospital's camelid medicine services provide a much-needed resource for the community.

Every January, the school hosts the Camelid Symposium, a hugely popular two-day event that attracts hundreds of owners from across the western United States. Pedroni serves on the planning committee for the symposium, always enthusiastic about promoting camelid health.

5 Steps to "Peace of Mind" When Someone Else Takes Your Alpacas to a Show

Do you remember your first time taking alpacas to a show? Do you remember the anxious, excited feeling? For you... maybe it's a recent memory? For me it was AlpacaFest West in Nov. 2005. And that's when I got bit by "the show bug!"

Now fast forward through 11 years of showing alpacas and it's time for the California Classic Round-Up. Due to a conflict in the dates of the show, I would not be able to attend. However, that show bug was strong and I wanted to send my newest juvenile males! But how...? The show was over 550 miles away!

What if I prepared my alpacas and someone else could take them for me? It sounded simple; many alpaca breeders share the responsibilities in this way. Once before I relinquished the care of 2 of my juveniles to a very experienced breeder and they did fine. However, this time the closest ranch that met those criteria was about a 4 hour drive away and it just wasn't feasible.

The other option was to prepare a new alpaca breeder who would be going to their first show. So we set about to do just that. We decided to have them bring their 3 juveniles over to my ranch with plenty of time to train them along with my 5 young ones. Weather delays only allowed 10 days prior to the show departure day to get all the training completed. With the urgency upon us, I set a plan in motion to cover all aspects of a successful showing.

Since the handlers would be first timers, it was important to get them ready too. Here are the 5 steps we took to ensure a good experience for alpacas and handlers.



Step 1 – Prepare your alpaca to be handled by someone else

- Ask for volunteers who want to learn about alpacas to spend 30 minutes a few times before a show helping you out. I needed 5 additional volunteers to join the 3 first time handlers going to the show. I wanted to create a "Show-like environment" and have all alpacas training at the same time.
- After the initial halter training lessons by me, I let a volunteer walk the alpaca back and forth in a confined space before taking them out into a big field. This builds their confidence and I can watch to see how the alpaca is reacting with a stranger.
- If you have an unruly alpaca then attach it to one or two other alpacas on a three-way lead to get it to calm down. Give the alpacas some time to work out their squabbles. Then once they are walking in unison, hand them over to another handler.
- If you have multiple alpacas to train, then switch handlers during each training session several times.
- Practice having each alpaca line up with the handler standing in front and off to the side several times.
- Practice walking in different environments with different distractions present.
- Practice loading and unloading in a trailer. Practice standing still inside the trailer with multiple alpacas.

Step 2 – Prepare the Handler

• Once each handler is comfortable working with an alpaca then it's time to create a "mock show." Always remember to breathe! Remember to stay calm and relaxed.



- Practice lining up like in a staging area. Practice the crowding and try to keep your alpaca still.
- Practice entering the area on command and walking on a diagonal in front of a "mock judge." And then line up profile to the center of your mock show ring. Practice lining up the alpacas in a straight line with their toes pointed forward and balanced on all four feet. Then practice stepping to the left side of the alpaca and holding that pose.
- The next part is the tricky part if you try to rush it too much. Practice holding each alpaca as your "mock judge" comes around and checks the bite

and tail-lifting of each alpaca. Keep your alpaca calm as the "judge" feels the fiber in several areas. The handler should work with each alpaca to the point that it doesn't resist standing still while someone else touches it all over.

- Practice keeping the alpaca still while the "judge" walks around behind them.
- Then the fun part... practice accepting a ribbon and walking the alpaca in front of the line-up. The alpaca should start walking with just a little encouragement from you.

Step 3 - Prepare all the tack and supplies

- Make a list of all the supplies you normally take to a show. Go over the list with the handlers to be sure that every aspect is covered. Give them the original CVI and a copy.
- After you fit each halter to each alpaca, mark them in some way so that the handler will know for sure which one goes with which alpaca. If you are splitting supplies, be sure to put your name on the things you want back.
- Provide special show leads that are different from the barn leads.

Step 4 - Practice at the show

- Let the alpaca become familiar with the new surroundings.
- Walk the alpacas once you get your stall set up. Practice taking them in and out of the show ring. Practice walking on the diagonal and standing still. Have someone else join you in the ring to pretend you are in a line-up.
- Practice showing the bite and lifting the tail with ease. Get someone else to assist you.
- Practice walking around with a "mock ribbon" in front of the alpaca. We use leis around their necks.

Step 5 - Prepare to receive them back home

- Prepare a guarantine area for all the returning "show- kids."
- Prepare an area for the transfer of your tack and supplies. Go over your list with the handler.
- Remember to collect your ribbons and the show materials that the handlers got for you.

Well the show is over; the alpacas are back at the ranch and out of quarantine as I write this. I'm pleased with how well they all behaved and the handlers didn't have any surprises. During their 4 days away, I maintained in contact with the handlers and answered some of the logistical questions as they came up. I shared their exuberance as they showed each alpaca and won ribbons. Then smiled to myself knowing that I had prepared the alpacas and the handlers the best I could.








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
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
