Greeting Calpaca Members,

WOW this year is going by fast! I hope everyone is ready for summer and have either shorn or have your shearing date scheduled. Shearing is my next favorite season next to birthing. It is a great time to look at your harvest and efforts in your breeding program and evaluate how you are doing. Sending your fiber in for a histogram is a great tool for making breeding choices. I also like to get my hands on as much fiber as I can outside of my own animals.

Some of the things I ask myself in evaluating my fleeces are: what are my goals for my fiber? How can we do things better next year to meet those goals? Do I need to change the time I shear for cleaner fleeces or later for longer fleeces? It is also a good time to evaluate the health of your herd as you get a very clear picture of what your alpaca really looks like. I like to compare my alpacas weights to the prior years shearing at this time to evaluate if I need to make any dietary changes?

The California Classic was a very successful show despite more of our "not so sunny California" weather challenges. Our show once again remained in the black so a big shout out to Charlene Schmid and her team of volunteers who helped make this happen!!






Many alpaca breeders use livestock guardian dogs to help protect their herds from predators (or to convince the predators to go elsewhere for dinner!) The typical LGD breeds were developed over centuries on the vast plains of Turkey and Eastern Europe, and the mountainous regions of Western Europe. These are large-breed or giant-breed dogs, with varying coat lengths, and confident, independent personalities. Another commonality in these dogs: in the words of Bruce Springsteen these dogs were, "Born to RUN!"

We got our first Anatolian Shepherd puppy last summer, when she was not quite 4 months old. She is wonderful with people and dogs, and the alpacas continue to be amused by her. Thus far she lacks the dog aggression, which is commonly seen in LGDs, but she barks at coyotes and the neighbor's long horned cattle. We think her presence is an effective deterrent to predators, and that's all we wanted from her!

Through trial and error we have learned than no physical barrier alone will contain Karakus (Kara-KOOSH—it means "blackbird" in Turkish). Also, the "invisible fence" electric shock perimeter for which she wears a shock collar that is triggered when she crosses the "Invisible barrier", does little to contain her. Her momentum carries her through the shock area before she can react and turn back. However, the combination of our 5 foot no-climb fencing with a Fi-Shock "hot wire" suspended 6 inches above the fence, seems to do the trick, barring human error.

A week and a half ago, I made such an error, and Karakus got loose on a rainy night. Since she had frequently roamed



Of course, first I walked around my property and that of my neighbor, where she loves to bark at their cows. We know that she can break into their vacation home, using their un-locked leverhandled doors, so I checked each door to be certain they were closed, and peered through the windows to be sure there was no sign of a dog.

Next, I put a "Lost and Found" ad on **CraigsList**. This was great because several people emailed back with helpful suggestions, and I also met a man who lost his Anatolian Shepherd a few days after mine. I also put a notice on our community web site service, **Next Door West Marin**. I am certain other communities must have similar sites. From here I got leads to other social media sites. One site, www.petharbor.com allowed me to register my lost dog with nearly every animal control agency from Santa Clara to Mendocino, and out to Sacramento city and county. This was empowering! I also got a lead to **Josie's Lost Dog Alert of Sonoma County**, a Facebook-based network of wonderful concerned volunteers—they were answering me on-line before I had

even completed my application! Both sites offered great advice on making and placing posters and flyers, and they send alerts to area animal shelters and veterinarians. Later, when I contacted the Petaluma Animal Shelter, the gal stated that she had seen my posting on *Josie's Lost Dog Alert*! I suspect that other communities have similar support sites on Facebook or the internet, and I highly recommend them. All of these sites and contacts were free, although I learned that there are numerous internet sites that specialize in finding lost pets for a service fee—they contact an extended area of neighbors by telephone or email, and send out flyers by surface mail; and they contact area animal control agencies and veterinarians for you.

Of course, I also contacted my county Humane Society, and went in for a visit. These days the photos of "found" dogs and cats are posted on their websites promptly, so it's not as important that you come in personally—but they still encourage it and also gave me a few leads of local farms with reputations as animal rescue sites that might have had a dog "turned in". I also contacted Animal Control agencies for several surrounding counties, as well as Marin and Sonoma County Sheriffs and the local fire stations.

A friend, and alpaca breeder, Nicole Kure, pitched in to make and post eye-catching posters on bright fluorescent poster board. She and I had both visited the Dollar Store to pick up posterboard and other supplies for our signs. We had been advised to make the signs very bright, with minimal words, but include the word, "REWARD", on the signs. I also added "Spayed" on my signs, so that no one would pick her up to breed. Within 72 hours, our communities were plastered with signs!

As it turns out, Karakus was found in the neighbor's vacation home. It was clear that she had not been there the entire time, and I suspect she had been picked up on the road by someone so impressed with her size and sweet temperament, they decided to ignore her ID tag and microchip. As I had anticipated, they would have found that these are not typical back-yard dogs, and they can be destructive if they are confined without diversions. Also, they may have hoped to breed her, but checking for information on her on-line they would have found that she was spayed. So, they probably brought her back where she had been found, and "dumped" her. She was nearest the neighbors' house, and broke in through the unlocked door. Unfortunately, one of the bedroom door locks can lock by itself, and she found herself trapped in the house. She did the amount of damage you might expect from a 92 lb dog over probably 2 days, and she dropped 8½ lbs of weight (much of it dehydration).

So, the story ends happily! I am so impressed how the availability of social media has advanced our search for lost pets. I always considered a "lost cat" to be a "dead cat", but now those cats have a fighting chance! It's time-consuming, but I encourage anyone with a lost animal to contact Craig's list and your local humane societies and Animal Shelters. Judge for yourself what sort of radius is required for your search: because Karakus is built to cover many miles each day, and because we have a lot of traffic heading from the coast east to Tracy and Sacramento, I aimed for a 100-200 mile radius to contact by email.

Later, when my dog was found, I was careful to notify the websites, drop my Craig's list listing, and remove all those eye-catching signs—It's always best to be considerate of your neighbors, and in some communities you can be fined for placing those signs.

Using the Noodling Technique for Collecting Fleece, Or Preparing a Show Blanket

Author – Julie Roy with inspiration by Coarse Broads, Inc.

This method can also be used if...

- The weather is inclement on shearing day and fleece needs to dry before being skirted.
- You are preparing a show blanket and want to minimize contamination
- You use a sorter and they are behind at live shearing and need to keep fleeces organized until the sorter can catch up.

Supplies needed

1) 55 gal. clear plastic bags (U-line sells them by the box)


Cut the bottom of the bag, and then cut down one side making a large flat piece of plastic.

You can also use plastic sheeting that can be obtained at most home improvement stores. Just cut the sheeting in 6' lengths.

- 2) 33 gallon clear size bags
- 3) Small clear bags for neck fiber
- 4) Black marker
- 5) Labels with Owner ID, alpaca name & DOB, date of shearing, fiber length and color.
- 6) Sandwich size bag for fiber sample with ID written on it

Method for Blanket

- 1) Place the cut plastic 55 gal. bag under the alpaca before shearing begins. You can roll the alpaca slightly away from you and easily slip the bag under it.
- 2) Once the shearer has shorn both halves and the blanket is on the plastic, slide the plastic out from under the alpaca, towards you.
- 3) Put a "T" for tail & an "H" for head on the ends of the plastic. Picture #1
- 4) Wrap the top and bottom edges over the fleece so it meets in the middle, making sure the plastic covers the entire fleece. **Picture #2**
- 5) Fold in sides of plastic and gently roll fleece into tight "burrito". The roll can be secured with scotch tape if needed to hold it's shape. **Picture #3**
- 6) Place the roll on the scale and record blanket weight. Place the rolled fleece in properly labeled clear 33 gallon size bag. **Picture #3A**

Method for Other Areas of Body

- 1) Once the blanket is removed, collect the neck fiber and long haunch areas in the small clear bags making sure to push aside any short cuts from lower jaw, and any hairy areas (brisket/chest).
- 2) If you are not careful in collecting the neck fiber and inadvertently include all the garbage with it, the usable fiber will become contaminated resulting in higher loss.
- 3) Weigh the neck fiber and put the small clear bag in the 33 gallon clear size bag along with the rolled up blanket fleece.
- 4) Gather all the short cuts together and combine for several alpacas in a separate bag.

Proper shearing and fleece collection is the key to maximizing your yearly harvest.

While good shearing will not improve the fleece of your alpaca, poor shearing can ruin it! It is very important that you work with the shearer and the shearer works with you, when gathering the fleece and cleaning up the shearing area, or all your efforts will be wasted and you will be disappointed with the outcome of your harvest.

It is very important to have each person have the basic knowledge of what fiber needs to be collected verses just letting the youngest member of the farm grab your fleeces and throw them into a bag.

Neonatal Seminar and Wet Lab Workshop Valuable For Attendees

Sierra Rose Alpacas recently hosted Dr. Robin Skillman's Neonatal Seminar and Wet lab Workshop for 15 participants. They learned about the many aspects of caring for healthy alpaca's before and during pregnancy, birthing and post birthing.

They learned what a normal birth and cria look like which included when and how to give proper assistance and when to let nature take its course. They also learned what to do if no vet is available and dam is not progressing to proper conclusion. They also learned how to determine when to call the vet.

When asked what the participant liked best about the workshop, some of the responses were: "Sticking my hands in the bag" (i.e. identifying dystocia and how to help); "All questions were answered"; "Liked the hands on wet lab and the lecture before that with visual aids"; "attention holding presentation" "how to stay calm and let nature take its course", "knowing when to call the Vet", "size of the class was perfect" and some even liked Cynthia's homemade chili, salad and corn bread.

All of the participant's would recommend this class with the general consensus being "This class is a must if you breed alpacas."

All in all it was a great day. New friendships formed and old friendships deepened. Everyone left feeling more confident in their understanding of how to care for dam and cria, even when good things go bad. People felt they gained knowledge in knowing what is normal, what is not, while determining their best course of action to get a good outcome for all concerned.
