

Legislative Issues - Tom not much going on at this time.

Alpaca Fiber for Oil Mitigation-no one stepped up to help organize the effort to get fiber to the spill. Fiber did go into the boom project but the booms did not get used by BP.

Alpaca Rescue-The Calpaca board would like to give a big Thank you to Lin, Steve, Brenda and Karen for doing such a wonderful job. All but 2 of the 25 rescued alpacas have been placed. It takes a lot of time, effort, money and a huge heart to take on a rescue. The board asked on the survey what the membership expected in a case like this and most wanted more information. We are looking for someone to look into the different rescue efforts, Southwest Lama Rescue, Safe Haven and any other rescue that might be able to help in these hard times.

Survey Monkey as a survey tool-Everyone that replied to the surveys that went out wanted more information. We will try to give you more in the future.

Submitting issues/concerns/word on the street to the Board. Please, if there is something that you feel the board should be addressing, please send us an email, grab us at a meeting or just call. We are here to service the membership and need your help to do this.

Other Business:

RFP's – Dale, Dianna, Jack and a few others have put together RFP's (request for proposals) to be used in hiring all help for paid positions. This includes show programs, event managers, Connection, show super's, announcers and so on. If you would ever like to be considered for any of these jobs, the forms will be located on the Calpaca web site soon.

AWE – Kay advised that AWE did not need money to cover costs. Somehow there was more money after bills were paid and a checking account that had not been touched in years. AWE has been postponed until 2012. In this time we hope to find a new venue in the CA area to host the show. Kay is sending out RFP's and is looking for a facility with at least 70,000 square feet to hold the show.

IAO is going to be held at the Ventura County Fairgrounds, March 17-18, 2011. The new format is very exciting and new rules are posted at www.iaoshow.com.

Dale went to the 3rd annual Fiber Symposium in Virginia and said it was a very intense meeting. Main focus on fiber and finished product. AOBA gave \$1000 to have alpaca fiber rated (tensile strength, flammability and so on). We are still in a cottage industry with the blanket project using the most fiber (25,000 lbs) the Co-Op using between 15-20,000 lbs and down from there. There are 42 mini mills in the states. Still, not everyone is using their fiber. To make this a successful industry, we need to get our fiber out there.

Connection has not been sent out yet. We would like you expectations on what you think the Connection should be. Survey sent out about how you wanted to get your Connection and it was split, email or snail mail. We will start putting the Connection in an email form so we can have an archive of past issues. We will also add another question at renewal – Connection – Email or mailed or both?

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Entering Spin-offs and Why Would I Want To?

It seems like every time I turn around there is an email in my inbox advertising another alpaca show somewhere in the country and each one is encouraging me to drop everything right now and send in my entry for the Spin-off by a specified deadline. And then a couple days prior to said deadline – another email comes out telling me that the deadline has been extended so hurry up and get your entries prepared and submitted.

So, just what is this spin off competition, why would you want to enter it, and what do they mean by prepared?

A spin off competition offers you, the breeder, an opportunity to have your alpacas fleece evaluated for processing – including ease of preparation, ease of spinning, the finished product – and to take away a small sample skein of the resulting yarn.

Currently the judging point system awards 25 - 30% of the points for the actual prep, processing, and resultant yarn. Approximately 35% of the points can be affected by your preparation of the entry and the rest are specific to the fiber itself – much like the evaluation in a fleece show.

So - how do you enter a spin off?

First, choose the fleeces that you want to enter. Just like for a fleece show, the entry must have been shorn within 380 days of the date of the show. Lay out the fleece on a table and pick out an area that **best** represents the entire fleece. From this area (you can pick and choose around the fleece), take out a 2-3 oz portion. Since the judge only sees what you send in, you will get a better score and a nicer yarn if you select and skirt the sample for uniformity/consistency.

Preparing the sample:

1. Before you do any work – check first for parasites and then check the length of the fiber. Parasitic infestation is grounds for immediate disqualification. And, the minimum qualifying length is 3 inches. If the sample submitted is shorter than that – it is automatically disqualified. When I found samples that had short areas I checked throughout to determine if there was at least a ½ ounce of fiber 3" or longer – essentially if I could determine that at least 25% of the sample was long enough, I didn't disqualify it. This is currently at the discretion of the individual judges.

The maximum allowable lengths are the same as stated in the show rules for a fleece show. For huacayas, the length must be between 3 and 8". Suri fleeces must be between 3 and 9" in length. The one length exception is for a first shearing on an animal less than 24 months of age. There is no maximum for this exception.

- 2. Spin off rules state that the sample must be between 2 and 4 oz of prime fiber. You will lose 1 point for every tenth of an ounce less than the 2oz minimum or more than the 4 oz maximum. (I had one entry in the Gold Country Spin-off that lost 25 points because they submitted 6.25 oz!). Weigh the sample before placing it in the zip lock bag. If your scale doesn't weigh to tenths of ounces or if you think it might be a little off then send in about 2.5 ounces. Although all the fiber you submit should be returned to you along with the resulting yarn it has been my experience that you don't always get back the "left overs". So, with good preparation, there is no need to send in more than the required minimum amount.
- 3. The obvious first preparation step (once you have selected the portion of the fleece you plan to submit) should be to remove as much of the vegetation and dirt as possible. Also do some basic skirting just like preparing the entire fleece for a show look for those really strong primary staples/locks (guard hairs, 3rds), really dirty areas, etc. and take them out! As in anything produced, garbage in results in garbage out and you want the highest number of points so your entry will have the blue ribbon hanging on it when you get to the show!

If you can feel vegetation when you lightly squeeze the fiber in your hands – then when the judge opens up that fiber – they have additional work to do on your entry before they can spin and that counts as points deducted. Hold the sample over a bowl, or the garbage can or something and shake it lightly. The more loose dirt and teeny vegetation that you can shake out – the less the judge has to do.

DO NOT WASH YOUR ENTRY! All entries must be submitted in a natural state – although as stated above, the removal of loose vegetation and dirt that doesn't disturb the condition of the fiber is allowed and recommended. The judge will wash the yarn after it has been spun and plied.

- 4. Next, look for second cuts and guard hair that might be in the sample you have selected. Remove these! Watch for those teeny little shear "burrs" of fiber that the shears leave behind and that get buried in the cut ends especially on the very dense huacaya fleeces. These are very hard to remove once the judge starts prepping the fiber.
- 5. The entry must be submitted in a "clear, unmarked, plain, **gallon-size** zipper type plastic bag". Some Ziploc and Glad brand bags have their labeling printed on the bags with spaces for writing. These bags are ok as long as YOU don't write anything on them. I have found that my local dollar store carries a very nice totally clear gallon sized zipper bag that fits the requirements perfectly. If you forget and write the alpaca's name on the bag or your ranch name or anything the superintendent is supposed to re-bag the sample before sending it on to the judge. Sometimes they miss and then the judge has to take extra time and expense to put your entry into a bag the way you should have before sending it in. The judge cannot know anything about the breeder or the specific animal during processing.
- 6. Before you put the entry into the bag, weigh it again to be sure you still have at least 2 oz and then a last step you can do to enhance your point total is to line up the fiber. Line up the staples with all the butts together and all the tips together looking like a little picket fence! You may need to make two or three rows within the bag but doing this one last step will make everything the judge needs to do to evaluate your entry much, much easier. Although grabbing a handful of suri fiber usually keeps it "lined up" taking the time to lay it out uniformly before placing it into the bag, actually makes determining length and uniformity much easier for the judge.

First impression is worth 10 points! Do the above and you'll probably end up in the 9-10 point range.

- 7. To finish prepping your sample for submission a completed "AOBA Handcrafter's Spin-Off Entry Tag" should be inserted into the bag. This will identify the animal including birth date, date of this shearing, date of last shearing (or birth date, if a first shearing), age class, and color. You also need to include a 4"x6" (or smaller) color photo of the animal and a copy of the ARI certificate with the entry, but not in the bag.
- 8. Follow the instructions for registration including to whom and where to send the entry and fees and submit as far before the deadline as possible. The reason you see extended deadlines is because of the people that wait til the last minute to submit. The original deadline is set with agreement from the judge that they have enough time to process the estimated number of entries and return them, completed, to the superintendent approximately 2 weeks or more prior to the actual show. Extended deadlines generally mean that the judge gets more entries than planned for and then has to really scramble to meet all the deadlines.

You've done your part - now what?

Once the entries are received by the spin-off superintendent, they put them into classes following the rules set forth by AOBA in the Show System Handbook. The entries are grouped by age and then by color. Once completed, the superintendent creates a scorecard for each entry and a worksheet per class for the judge and the entries (without the specific identifying info – name, ranch, picture, ARI cert, etc.) are turned over to the judge.

What is the judge looking for - And what will my scorecard tell me?

Huacaya entries are judged as follows with the maximum number of points per category listed:

The first 35 points available can absolutely be affected by how well you prepare your entry before sending it in!! Suri entries are judged as follows with the maximum points available listed:

The first 33 points of the suri sheet can be affected by how well you prepare your entry before submitting it!!

The judge starts by taking the fiber out of the bag and weighing it. If less than 2oz or greater than 4oz the judge will determine the amount of deduction and record that on the scorecard. The judge will also be looking for parasitic infestation at this time – automatic disqualification if found.

Next the judge will pull out a few staples/locks from various sections of the sample and measure them. If too long or too short – the entry is disqualified. Anything over about 6" for a huacaya fleece is awkward to process smoothly using hand cards for hand spinning. The really long suri fleeces and/or those that are tightly twisted into the pencil locks that are loved in the show ring and fleece show – are a big challenge to process whether by hand or by machine.

The judge will next look at cleanliness. Does a dust cloud arise when the sample is lightly patted? When the sample is picked up off the table – is there dirt and vegetation left behind? Can the judge feel a lot of imbedded vegetation when lightly squeezing the fiber sample? Are there second cuts that should have been removed? What about guard hair? Good preparation on your part should result in high points for cleanliness, lack of second cuts, and lack of guard hair. (If you see guard hairs protruding from the end of the staple/lock – it is ok to pull them out during prep!)

Next the judge reviews the sample for strength, uniformity, fineness, hand, etc. You don't have any preparation control over these categories and this is very subjective depending upon the background of the judge.

Now the judge begins the processing. A first fleece in both huacaya and suri will usually have drier tips (not necessarily weak) that trap vegetation and dirt. These should be opened up as much as possible by flick carding the huacaya tips and combing the suri tips. There will be some loss of fiber during this process. At the same time – the butt/cut ends should be flick carded or combed depending on fiber type. Flick carding the butt ends of a dense huacaya fleece will expose buried second & burr cuts, while combing the cut end of suri will open up the locks and remove cotting.

By the second fleece – these first steps should not be necessary. However, there is the occasional first fleece entered from an animal that is between 12 and 24 months. These entries suffer – because most if not all of the other entries in that class are a 2nd shearing. How these fleeces are prepared can and will vary between judges, but whatever a judge does for one fleece in a class – they have to do to all the entries in that same class.

To finish the prep for the huacaya entries, I finger picked the fiber to remove as much dirt and vegetation as possible and then hand carded the fiber into rolags for spinning. After combing the tips and cut ends of all the suri entries, I was able to go straight to the carding without a picking step.

Each entry was put through 3 washes with detergent, 2 clear water rinses, and hung in the sun to dry. Many of the entries started out so dirty that they could have used more soap washes – but again, I had to pick a number that seemed to work best for the majority.

Finally the resulting yarn was judged along with the brightness or luster of the fiber and the scorecards were completed and signed.

It totally amazed me to find an awesome fleece that made a very inconsistent yarn and to find a not so wonderful fleece that resulted in an amazing yarn. Many times the entry that resulted in the nicest yarn ended up at or near the bottom in overall points and many times the entry that had the highest initial points resulted in a less than impressive yarn. The beautiful, soft, fine first fleece that felted when you just look at it crossways — will be a big disappointment if you pay a mini-mill or other commercial processor to make yarn. It may come back as a nice yarn, but the first time you wash (no matter how careful) the finished garment — it will felt. These are the things that you want and need to know about your fiber.


So, now what?


If you earned a blue ribbon – congratulations! If you didn't, take the time to look at the score cards from the other entries in your class and check out the differences. Was it in the preparation? Now you know how to change that. Was it in the fleece evaluation? That's where good breeding decisions can improve the score. Was it in the ease of prep or ease of spinning? Did the judge tell you why you lost points there – again, was it an entry preparation issue? Was the fleece too long? Too dirty? Too much vegetation? Was it something that you can change next time?

Collect those ribbons, make mental notes of what to do different next time, and take home that fun little skein of yarn. Put it on display and when a potential customer comes by to look at that alpaca – show them the yarn and tell them that this is how that alpacas fleece looks and feels when spun up. Can't they just imagine wearing a sweater made out of that yarn?

Fortitude, Grit, and Determination!

At the **Gold Country Gathering** I was privy to what this industry can be all about - a beautiful outdoor venue for a first-time show in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada ranges of California, an event hosted by our very progressive Calpaca Affiliate, a group of alpaca breeders out for a good time and a ribbon or two and a test of endurance, patience and understanding.

My lady and I arrived at 4.30 on Friday just as the rain started to fall and left at 4pm on Sunday while it was pelting rain and wind - and not for one minutes did it stop raining!

Tall pines with simple open sided, wooden-framed pens surrounding a high-roofed ring on sloping ground in a rural showground was a setting to die for. Nearly 300 animals, a GREAT group of breeders, one or two first-time showers, a small fleece show, the usual silent auction as well as a fiber arts exhibition of surprising depth and good quality (at least in my eyes!), a sponsored Saturday night barbeque and wine plus a get-together on the Friday night with breeders hosting tables bulging with cheeses by the dozen, freshly smoked salmon, breads, dips, sausage, sweet nibblies, plenty of conversation and chiaking - it was a simply wonderful display of fellowship and collegiate respect.

While the rain started with a drizzle it quickly moved to persistent and then into full storm mode - water gushing everywhere, pens being flooded out, people in wet-weather gear of considerable bulk and variety of color, wet shoes and socks, young men running around doing water abatement works, breeders huddled around gas heaters whilst the wind drove the rain into the judging ring where Diana Timmerman displayed great fortitude, goodwill and great humor to continue judging to the very end after the exhibitors voted to continue the show despite what was atrocious weather - it really was test of spirit.

It truly was miserable walking reluctant animals through mini-lakes of water, getting drenched (can you get re-drenched after being drenched the first time?), huddling like penguins to find succor and warmth from the masses ... this was THE show of shows!!


For all who attended I 'dips me lid' and hope that everyone got as much satisfaction and enjoyment out of the adversity that brought us all together in a show that deserved so much more!

National Disaster Rescue Information From: Sheila Fugina, IRC Council

National Lama Intervention & Rescue Coordination Council

As a result of the networking efforts of several camelid organizations, a communication system for disaster response and relief has been set up on the web site for the International Camelid Institute (ICI). The tornadoes and floods in the Midwest were the most recent impetus to putting such a plan together, but the wildfires and droughts in other parts of the country started the discussions much earlier. Contact information and links have been provided on the site for national, regional and local agencies involved with disaster preparedness, response and relief for both people and animals. A list of owners with immediate needs such as water, pasture, hay and shelter will be posted on the site shortly, as will a list of people offering help (transportation, pasture room, water, etc.). The list will be updated often over the next several weeks as ICI receives additional information. Specific concerns and suggestions from camelid veterinarians regarding disaster response and relief also will be posted on the site.

Much of the data in several of the reports was compiled by Sandra Wallace and her team members on the Alpaca Owner and Breeders Association (AOBA) Affiliate Congress who then worked with ICI and the IRC Council to get the actual communication system in place. Though the current concern is with the problems in the Midwest, the system is intended to provide immediate communication regarding any disaster nationwide. Please inform your members they can go to ICI's web site at www.icinfo.org and click on "Help for Affected Flood Owners" under the Hot Topics section for information and help not only for this latest weather related crisis, but also for future disaster concerns.
